The passion with which members of our community engage in supporting sustainable European aquaculture was commented on by representatives of DG MARE during the launch event, and it is a passion which is deeply held within our EATiP platform.

I commend the work, energy and indeed "passion" of our Secretariat and membership. I encourage you to engage further with our Platform. In the challenging times to come, our strength will come from our strong network, shared vision, and commitment to collaboration.

General Secretary's Remarks:

At a recent meeting with one of our Mirror Platforms, we discussed the current global situation and the outlook for research funding at the European level. Being positive by nature, we concluded that "*challenges equal opportunities*." This statement holds true in several senses, in that challenges and opportunities often require us to adapt to new systems and realities—a principle that applies to European research and innovation, as well as other fields.

As our President notes above, the first quarter of 2025 has indeed proven to be an intense period for us, with significant effort on our part on project actions, policy and consultation work and consideration of the future for European research and innovation funding. You will find below a summary of the core activities we have been undertaking.

One of EATiP's core functions is to participate in EU projects, usually focusing on communication, dissemination, and exploitation actions, as well as addressing the science-policy interface. As noted during our General Assembly last year, communication effort with our membership has been under consideration by the Secretariat for some time. We see the need to undertake more outreach with members and engage more effectively; it is essential that you our members should be well-informed about our activities and actions.

PROJECTS



Projects and Activities

EATiP is participating in several EU funded [projects](#), either as a direct consortium partner or sub-contractor or as a representative on a project Advisory Board. Our primary function relates to communication, dissemination, exploitation and knowledge transfer, alongside actions relating to science / policy interface.

-Smart Specialisation Strategies (S3) for the Blue Economy.



Further to the initial announcement that S3 was being extended to include the Blue Economy, EATiP has been an early and proactive advocate in ensuring that aquaculture stakeholders may benefit through the opportunities afforded by S3 and associated funding mechanisms for innovation transfer. In collaboration with lead region Hauts de France, EATiP applied for and were successfully approved to establish a Thematic Smart Specialisation Platform (TSSP) addressing [Circular Smart Aquaculture](#). Specific objectives of the TSSP include improving energy and water efficiency, addressing feed ingredient scarcity, optimising by-product use, and developing capacity building for a skilled workforce.

A DG MARE / CINEA EMFAF call was launched earlier this year, for which EATiP has submitted a funding proposal in conjunction with CSIC (Spain) and 11 other full partners from the EATiP network, alongside several additional supporters. A total of 42 proposals were submitted, of which an estimated 11 will be funded. Competition is stiff.

The proposal was developed with many of the EATiP Mirror Platforms and other TSSP regions, to whom we reiterate our thanks for your support and considerable effort and input.

-AQUAEXCEL 3.0

In May 2024, EATiP member [EMBRC](#) joined AQUAEXCEL3.0's Transnational Access (TNA) programme to widen access to aquaculture research facilities in Europe.



Transnational access in aquaculture

Since 2020, the AQUAEXCEL3.0 project has advanced European aquaculture research through several key initiatives:

1. Transnational access to 40 key European aquaculture research facilities:

Researchers, doctoral students, company staff have carried out experimental research projects at state-of-the-art infrastructures at one of the project's 22 partner institutions. In total, the project has the ambition to provide access opportunities to 200 different projects. EATiP leads the AQUAEXCEL3.0 work to support the innovation capabilities of the project. By the end of 2024, a total of 15 projects have been selected by the Industry and Research Advisory Panel (IRAP) as having a potentially high impact on the aquaculture sector. In May 2024, AQUAEXCEL3.0 partnered with the European Marine Biological Resource Centre (EMBRC) to broaden its Transnational Access program to facilities like aquaria, mesocosms, and molecular biology platforms.

2. Training and Capacity Building The project has conducted several online training courses to disseminate best practices and new technologies. These include a course on using modeling tools for experimental design (*March 2024*), a training on conducting experimental infection trials in fish and shellfish (*November 2024*), and a course focusing on shellfish and seaweed production in research infrastructures (*January 2025*).

3. Technological Innovations AQUAEXCEL3.0 developed a standardised protocol for real-time microbiome monitoring, an enhanced Virtual Laboratory featuring an artificial agent to assist in experimental planning, and methods for processing biotelemetry data.

4. Research Dissemination and Industry Engagement At the AQUA2024 conference in Copenhagen, AQUAEXCEL3.0 hosted a Brokerage event during the conference's Innovation Forum. It was showcasing knowledge outputs from three selected TNA

projects: a study on improving trout welfare through environmental enrichment, converting food waste into fish feed using black soldier fly larvae, and the application of CryoPlankton in seabass aquaculture.

These activities emphasise AQUAEXCEL3.0's commitment to enhancing aquaculture experimental research, fostering innovation and promoting sustainable practices across Europe. To learn more, go to [AQUAEXCEL 3.0](#)



-OLAMUR The Offshore Low-Trophic Aquaculture in Multi-Use Realisation (OLAMUR) project is part of the EU-funded [Mission Ocean](#) Lighthouse initiative. This project is demonstrating the concept of multi-use in the North Sea and Baltic Sea. It has a duration of four years, and EATiP is responsible for all communication and dissemination activities.

Having passed its halfway mark, OLAMUR has made significant progress in deploying its main facilities within wind farm parks located in Denmark (Kriegers Flak) and northern Germany (Helgoland). Both locations serve as demonstration sites for nutrient cycling through setups that include seaweed species, mussels, and oysters, while also focusing on sustainable low-trophic seafood production. This approach aims to maximise the use of marine space within the renewable wind energy sector.

The third site in Estonia features an Integrated Multi-Trophic Aquaculture (IMTA) system that includes Ulva, mussels, and rainbow trout, serving primarily for data collection.



SmartUnits set up

Last year, four marker buoys were deployed in the Meerwind Süd/Ost wind farm, located north of Helgoland in the southern North Sea. These buoys mark the research site where aquaculture devices, known as SmartUnits, were installed.

In addition to these structures at the German case study site in the North Sea region, the shellfish tower has been installed.

This structure, which was constructed at the Alfred Wegener Institute (AWI), is the first of its kind and will be used for cultivating and producing oysters (*Ostrea edulis*).

-AQUAPHOENIX

Launched in January 2025, the AQUAPHOENIX project aims to develop an innovative solution to reduce Aquaculture emissions and valorise ludge through Phosphorus and Nitrogen Extraction. The project focuses on capturing waste and transforming it into sustainable products for energy, agriculture, and aquaculture.



Driven by partners FRAMO, LiftUP, AquaPro, and Ragn-Sells, the project builds on over a decade of technology development for efficient collection, dewatering, and storage of sludge and excess feed from open cages. The technology's effectiveness has been validated through several pilot projects with Norwegian fish farmers.

As lead co-partner in two work packages, addressing policy and governance and communications EATiP aims to maximise the AQUAPHOENIX knowledge sharing and outreach through effective CDE plan and networks.

The project will interact closely with the Sludge Network, in which many EATiP members are active and managed by (EATiP Board Member) Ann Cecile Hilling of the [NCE Aquaculture Cluster](#) in Norway. Learn more about [AQUAPHOENIX](#).

-OCCAM -Operationalizing Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation for aquaculture.

With a kick off date in mid-May 2025, EATiP be assisting on communication and dissemination efforts for the OCCAM project addressing the challenges outlined in the HORIZON-CL6-2024-FARM2FORK-02-7- two-stage call "Minimising climate impact on aquaculture: mitigation and adaptation solutions for future climate regimes". The overall OCCAM objective is to develop, deploy, test, and evaluate innovative solutions for climate change adaptation and mitigation in the aquaculture sector and to deliver recommendations and scalable, exploitable, and replicable

solutions ready for use or further refinement for a wide variety of aquaculture supply chains. EATiP will also be responsible for delivering a White Paper towards the end of the project on integrating project recommendations into European policy-making for the aquaculture sector.

- Aquaculture Assistance Mechanism (AAM)

EATiP is a member of the Consortium delivering the Aquaculture Assistance Mechanism (AAM) - a contract awarded through CINEA and DG MARE – with the AAM being listed as an objective of the Strategic Guidelines for a sustainable European aquaculture.



Many EATiP members have also been engaged in the process to date, and we have been delighted to be able to recommend many of you to be approached and contacted for technical advice and expertise.

Of particular interest to our members will be the [AAM Knowledge Base](#) where information is provided on research outputs, projects, policy papers and much more besides. Of particular interest are the Commission Staff Working Documents, giving best practices on a number of priority areas including Funding, Climate Change, Access to Space and Regulation, Environmental Performance and Energy Transition.

Although not a research and innovation project *per se*, nonetheless, Secretariat time has been funded through the contract, particularly when working on the Guidance Documents above.

-MEDI Green Launch

Further to the successful conclusion of the MSPGreen project, where EATiP sat on the Advisory Board providing input with regard to the implications of Marine Spatial Planning for Green Deal delivery for the aquaculture sector, we are delighted to have been approached to continue to offer input on the follow up project, MEDIGreen - with a specific focus on MSP and Green Deal delivery for the Mediterranean basin. CONSULTATION

Policy Work

The primary focus of EATiP is on issues related to research, innovation, and knowledge transfer. However, with the advent of the new European Commission and the consideration of the **Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF)** for

2025, there has been a significant increase in our policy activities this year. Whilst a more substantial consultation response is currently being developed regarding the MFF and the future of the 10th Framework Programme in relation to the EU Competitiveness Fund, during the first quarter of this year "Calls for Evidence" have been returned on:

- [Ocean Pact](#)
- [Water Resilience Strategy](#)
- [European Life Sciences Strategy](#)

Many members will be aware that the [European Union Multi-Annual Financial Framework](#) is currently out for public consultation. EATiP has been closely following this topic. The principal area of our interest is in the future of any future Framework Programme, specifically in relation to the proposed European Competitiveness Fund. Whilst the EC Commissioner for Start Ups, Research and Innovation (Ekaterina Zaharieva) has recently (March 2025) gone on record as saying "we can have both" (i.e. the European Competitiveness Fund and a standalone Framework Programme for research and innovation) there remains concern as to how much funding will be made available and how this funding will be allocated across what are currently Pillars 1 and 2 of Horizon Europe.

What will become of the current Cluster 6 - under which Bio-economy and aquaculture currently fall - remains unclear.

EATiP continue to engage on this during the current period of uncertainty. However, our sector is small, and the entire bio-economy and agricultural sector faces common concerns over funding reallocations in the light of climate, energy and other security concerns. As interest groups, we need to double up. To that extent, EATiP have been working with other bio-economy ETPs and seeing what further collaboration there can be with groups such as [EARTO](#), [ERINN](#), [EFARO](#) and others.

In early April, together with over 40 other European organisations an open letter was sent to Commission President [Ursula von der Leyen](#), calling for a strong and independent EU Research & Innovation Framework Programme 10 ([#FP10](#)) with a dedicated budget.

We invite you to share the Open Letter on your media channels and with relevant contacts to enhance its impact and visibility.

We hope to be able to provide further updates during our General Assembly in June, although we must emphasise that at the current time, European Commission staff are equally unclear as to what final funding arrangements will be, given the changing and uncertain political context we are operating under.

The Future of EMFAF

A further area of concern for EATiP members is the impact of the possible inclusion of **EMFAF** funds in any new National / MS funding programme. We have noted various concerns about this, both from the aquaculture industry and also from Regional Authorities and Government agencies, who fear that funds will be swallowed up from smaller thematic areas /sectors and be retained by financially constrained MS Governments looking to reallocate funding from wherever they can. Naturally, we are concerned if reduced EMFAF funding adversely affects research or research and innovation transfer within European Union member states. The combined maritime Advisory Councils (see below) have written an open letter in support of EMFAF, alongside producer associations such as [FEAP](#) (an EATiP member) and individual [EATiP Mirror Platforms](#). Through this, the Secretariat continues to follow this important topic.

Aquaculture Advisory Council (AAC)

EATiP remains an active member in the AAC, primarily through our Chairing the Research Focus Group, where recommendations have been considered on Research and Innovation priorities and knowledge transfer. A recommendation on research and innovation priorities should be issued in the name of the AAC later this summer, directed towards both the European Commission and Member States.



The EATiP Board convened a subcommittee, representing both finfish and Shellfish producers, to consider industry priorities, and these, in association with the EATiP SRIA, helped shape the EATiP contribution and drafting of the AAC recommendation. Learn more about [AAC](#).

Meetings with the European Commission and other European level bodies.

In addition to several standalone events, EATiP has continued to engage with a variety of different teams within the European Institutions. So far this year we have met with both the Water and Healthy Oceans and Food and Bio-economy units of DG RTD, specifically providing updated research priorities for the shellfish sector, in collaboration with colleagues at EMPA. We have also met with DG MARE, including the units for Aquaculture, Blue Economy, Marine Spatial Planning and through the invitation of EATiP Board Member Raphaëla le Gouvello ([IUCN](#)) attended a cross departmental briefing on [RegenerativeBlue Economy](#). EATiP has also met with CINEA, and have been invited to present on both the OLMAUR project and AAM on the EC stand during [European Maritime Day](#) in May. Finally, EATiP has also participated in the Q1 [SCAR-Fish Committee](#) – discussing research priorities at this challenging time for the RTDI community.

Emerging Trends in Research Policy

Members often ask for comments on emerging trends and priorities for research from a European policy perspective. In common with many stakeholders, we await the publication of the Communication on a European Ocean Pact, which will give a clear

expression of EC intentions. What is becoming very clear is that future priorities are going to centre on the themes of "resilience", "restoration" and "regeneration" and it is important that we therefore consider the need for aquaculture research through this prism. We remain confident these themes will allow for all aspects of aquaculture to be presented in a good light - in terms of both food security and also comparative benefits in terms of environmental, social and economic contributions to regenerative aquatic environments. We avoid making any certain predictions, but it is likely we will see a trend to move away from referencing "sustainability" and instead, a move towards "restorative and regenerative" objectives, particularly within future project call texts.

EATiP Mirror Platforms (MiPs)

The EATiP Mirror Platform Working Group continues to prove very active, providing important bottom-up prioritisation for EATiP actions. So far this year, the group has been active with regard to S3 development (see above) in addition to considering areas for further joint working.



We are delighted to report a new member of EATiP - and the [EATiP Mirror Platform Working Group](#) - in the form the [UK AgriTech Centre](#). A more detailed focus will be provided in a future newsletter, and we look forward to welcoming the UK AgriTech Centre to our AGM in June. Not only does this herald a very welcome return of the UK to the EATiP platform but the AgriTech Centre brings with it a wealth of knowledge, expertise and opportunity for EATiP member collaboration.

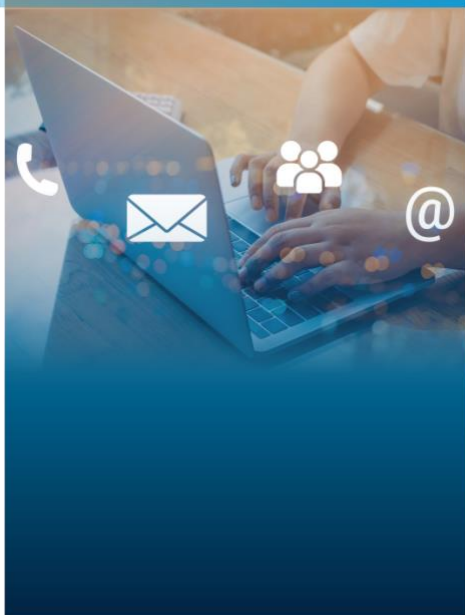
